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Pursuant to D.08-12-058¹, San Diego Gas & Electric Company (“SDG&E”) hereby serves the following quarterly project status report on the progress of the Sunrise Powerlink Transmission Project (“Sunrise”) in accordance with ordering paragraph #13.²

I. THE DECISION DIRECTS SDG&E TO PROVIDE THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION

Ordering paragraph #13, as well as in discussions in the body of the Decision,³ directs SDG&E to provide project status updates, answering eight questions regarding the progress of the project.

1. Comprehensive project development schedule, including estimated project in-service date;

SDG&E’s Q4 2009 project development schedule is attached to this report as Appendix A. The estimated project in-service date remains approximately June 2012.

This allows the reports to capture the quarter-ending financial data that is not available on the final day of the quarter, but is available in the early part of each following month. SDG&E believes that this schedule will provide the Commission with the most current and accurate information available.

2. Any changes in project scope and schedule, including the reasons for such changes;

There are no changes to the project scope or schedule at this time.

3. Specifically address the need for the Encina transformer, the cost of undergrounding in Alpine Boulevard, and the amount of undergrounding contemplated;

The California Independent System Operator (“CAISO”) confirmed the need for the Encina transformer in a letter to ALJ Vieth and the Sunrise service list on April 28, 2009. The transformer is scheduled to be in-service on or before June 2012.

The status of the undergrounding in Alpine Boulevard has not changed; the portion of the route from Peutz Valley to the entrance to the Star Valley Option is approximately 5.85 miles in length under the current design. There are still two alternatives under consideration for the eastern terminus of the underground line, the east Alpine Boulevard alternative (an additional 2.05 miles of underground) and the Revised Star Valley Option (an additional .35 miles of underground).

The total estimated cost of undergrounding in Alpine Blvd remains unchanged at \$335M for the Peutz Valley to Alpine Blvd Alternative and \$244M for the Peutz Valley to the revised Star Valley Option. These costs do not include AFUDC, support costs or mitigation costs.

4. Any engineering difficulties encountered in constructing the project;

The terrain for much of the alignment is challenging. The inability to design access roads in certain areas due to environmental concerns has increased the need to access towers via helicopter. However, the engineering difficulties have not currently caused any change in cost, scope, or schedule.

5. Total estimated project costs;

The total estimated cost of the project remains unchanged at \$1.883 billion.

6. Actual spending to date;

The actual project spending through the end of the fourth quarter 2009 (12/31/09) is \$235 million.

7. Any and all filings submitted to FERC for ultimate cost recovery through transmission rates; and

No such filings have been submitted to date.

8. Any additional information SDG&E believes relevant and necessary to accurately convey the status of the Sunrise project.

a. SDG&E-Citizens Energy agreement

SDG&E and Citizens Energy (“Citizens”) reached a development and coordination agreement on May 11, 2009. This agreement is the result of discussions that follow from an earlier memorandum of agreement (“MOA”) regarding joint participation in the project, which was executed in 2006.⁴ Under the agreement, Citizens would lease 50% of the transfer capability of the Sunrise Powerlink from the Imperial Valley substation to the Imperial/San Diego County line for a term of 30 years. Citizens will prepay a lease amount for the 30 year term. Citizens agrees to request the CAISO to treat Citizens as a Participating Transmission Owner (“PTO”), turn over operational control of that capacity to the CAISO, and to seek acceptance by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (“FERC”) of transmission rates substantially similar to the rate SDG&E could recover if SDG&E constructed Sunrise without Citizens’ participation. Citizens’ transfer capability will revert back to SDG&E at the end of the 30 year lease.

SDG&E filed an application (also signed and verified by Citizens Energy) on October 9, 2009 with the Commission under Section 851 of the Public Utilities Code for approval of the development and coordination agreement with Citizens. Also on October 9, SDG&E and Citizens Energy filed petitions for a declaratory order with the FERC for approval of certain ratemaking and accounting treatment for the lease under this agreement. On December 17, 2009, FERC issued an order approving the ratemaking principles requested by Citizens and separately another order acceptable to SDG&E approving an accounting treatment applicable to SDG&E's treatment for the lease. The agreement does not change SDG&E's renewable energy commitments, Citizens has agreed to use a rate substantially similar to the rate that would be charged by SDG&E, and Citizens agrees to invest at least 50% of its profits from the agreement in low-income programs in the Imperial Valley.

b. Import limitation at Miguel Substation

Currently, imports into Miguel substation can be limited by the amount of generation that is being produced by the TDM and Intergen generators in Mexico. Low levels of generation restrict the amount of power that can be imported into Miguel substation because there is less generation that can be tripped—via a Special Protection Scheme (“SPS”)—in the Imperial Valley to mitigate an overload of one 500/230 kV transformer at Miguel substation for the loss of the other transformer.

In coordination with the CAISO, IID, CFE, and APS, SDG&E has modified the existing SPS to eliminate the need to limit imports into Miguel substation when the output of the TDM and Intergen plants is low. With the modified SPS, the maximum level of imports into Miguel substation is 1800 MW, regardless of how much power the TDM and Intergen plants are producing.

The SPS modifications were placed in service on August 3, 2009.

c. Procurement activities

As detailed in previous quarterly reports, pre-construction activities such as procuring long-lead equipment, land right acquisition, environmental surveys, and detailed engineering design are moving forward in order to meet the construction start date. Equipment such as lattice towers, underground cable and transformers for the new substation have been ordered and delivery of the towers and cable will begin in the second quarter of 2010. A Request for Proposals (“RFP”) for construction was issued and evaluation of the bidders’ responses is currently underway. Land acquisitions are continuing and 50% of the offers have been presented to property owners for acquisition of right-of-way. All initial offers are estimated to be completed by March 1, 2010.

d. Imperial Valley RFO developments

In June 2009, SDG&E issued a Request for Offers (“RFO”) seeking bids for renewable projects. As part of the RFO, SDG&E conducted targeted outreach for projects located in and surrounding the Imperial Valley. SDG&E hosted an August 2009 pre-bid conference in El Centro to provide support to local developers. The results were impressive. SDG&E received more offers from the Imperial Valley and Sunrise Powerlink surrounding areas than in any previous renewable solicitation. In total, the offers far exceeded the carrying capacity of the Sunrise Powerlink. The 2009 shortlist includes projects that would flow on Sunrise and SDG&E is currently negotiating with those shortlisted bidders. Although the solicitation has closed, SDG&E continues to receive inquiries from Imperial Valley developers who did not participate in the 2009 RFO.

e. Community outreach

To ensure each community receives timely and accurate information and to mitigate any inconveniences associated with the construction of Sunrise, SDG&E has voluntarily and

proactively set up seven Community Councils. These councils are designed as a way to establish a two-way dialogue with communities along the entire 120-mile route. Recognizing that each community would have differing concerns and unique issues, councils were formed in Imperial Valley, Alpine, Boulevard, Campo, Jacumba, Lakeside and the City of San Diego. Additionally, all Community Council meetings are open to the public.

Individuals were chosen to participate on the Community Councils by SDG&E, with input from local residents, business and community leaders along the route. Members were chosen who reflect the diverse nature and opinions of the community they are representing. This includes members who are and who are not in favor of the project. SDG&E tried to make sure residents, civic and business organizations, planning groups and impacted property owners are represented.

SDG&E wanted individuals on each council who would have the ability to work as a team, openly discuss potential issues related to the construction phase of the project and address any concerns once the project is complete. It is SDG&E's goal that these individuals will share what they learn through the community council process with residents and businesses in their area.

The first round of council meetings has taken place in all seven communities. Subsequent meetings are currently being set up for all councils and will be completed throughout the First Quarter 2010.

To obtain additional information on SDG&E's first round of community council meetings, please refer to the summary outlining key issues raised during these sessions, which is Appendix B to this report.

f. Environmental mitigation

SDG&E is in the process of implementing the construction and environmental mitigation measures identified in the Final Environmental Impact Report/ Environmental Impact Statement (“FEIR/EIS”). These measures cover a multitude of issue areas including biological, cultural, water, air, noise, land use, wilderness and recreational, and agricultural resources. As a first level of mitigation, SDG&E is attempting to avoid and minimize impacts to these issue areas as directed by the mitigation measures through further design refinements.

One of the significant mitigation measures requires that after minimizing impacts to biological resources and prior to incurring any project impacts a Habitat Acquisition Plan (“HAP”) must be prepared. The HAP details how the remaining impacts must be mitigated by the purchase of off-site habitat—often at an increased ratio of two or three to one. This plan will identify properties to be preserved and/or restored in areas along the project alignment. These properties will be coordinated with the governing wildlife and jurisdictional agencies, a Habitat Management Plan will be prepared, and an appropriate managing entity will be identified for long term management of the property. A draft of this plan was issued in June 2009, for review and comment by the relevant agencies, including the CPUC, BLM, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, CA Dept. of Fish & Game, City and County of San Diego. A second draft of the plan is being prepared for recirculation which will incorporate comments made by the agencies. This draft is expected to be issued during the first quarter of 2010.

g. Project permitting

Significant efforts are ongoing to obtain all permits and approvals from jurisdictional agencies. These include permits for such things as helicopter pads, stream crossings, dust suppression activities, noise abatement, staging yards, etc. In addition, the U.S. Forest Service is still in the process of evaluating final routing and environmental considerations in conjunction

with its Record of Decision (“ROD”), Plan Amendment and Special Use Permit. The issuance of the ROD as well as the Plan Amendment and Special Use Permit are necessary to commence construction on Forest Service lands in accordance with their land use specifications and mitigation requirements. The Forest Service’s completion of these in the near future will allow the project to maintain its current schedule.



Recap of First Round of Community Council Meetings

Overview and Purpose

SDG&E understands the significance of the Sunrise Powerlink and the challenges associated with the planned construction of the project beginning in 2010. From the beginning of the approval process in 2005 through the upcoming construction, SDG&E has been and remains committed to keeping the community informed so that accurate information is available and inconveniences can be kept to a minimum.

To achieve this goal during construction, SDG&E has set up a series of seven Community Councils along the approved route with the purpose of establishing a two-way dialog with community and business leaders who can serve as liaisons with their friends, neighbors and colleagues. SDG&E initially identified leaders from each area to participate on the Councils. However, each meeting is open to the public, and individuals that express an interest are welcome to attend.

Meetings to Date

A first round of meetings in each area was recently completed on the following dates:

- Imperial Valley – Wednesday, September 30, 2009
- Campo – Tuesday, October 27, 2009
- Boulevard – Tuesday, November 3, 2009
- Jacumba – Thursday, November 5, 2009
- Alpine – Tuesday, November 10, 2009 & Tuesday, December 15, 2009
- Lakeside – Thursday, November 12, 2009
- City of San Diego – Tuesday, December 8, 2009

Subsequent meetings are in the process of being scheduled.

Summary of Meetings

To date, each of the Community Councils has been structured in similar fashion. SDG&E has provided a thorough overview, which includes a brief history of the project and the estimated construction schedule. The presentation is followed by a question and answers session. The entire meeting typically lasts about 90 minutes. At the conclusion, the next date is set and a draft agenda is discussed.

During each meeting, SDG&E has arranged to bring several employees and consultants with expertise in a number of areas related to the project. This ensures that most questions can be addressed fully

Topics covered during meetings are generally specific to issues that affected each community. For example, the Alpine Community Council expressed an interest in learning more about the process of placing a high-voltage transmission line underground, given that 6.2 miles of the Sunrise Powerlink will be buried under Alpine Boulevard. In Jacumba and Boulevard, participants requested that SDG&E discuss in greater detail how the company plans to implement fire prevention and mitigation measures. Imperial Valley Community Council members inquired about the potential for project-related jobs.

Issues Raised

A wide range of issues were raised during the first round of Community Council meetings. Each was addressed by SDG&E and discussed in greater detail as needed. Listed below is summary of these issues in no order of importance or frequency:

- The possibility of seeking employment and hiring local companies for project work.
- The potential to impact off-road recreational activities.
- The nature of community enhancements and the decision-making process.
- Economic development resulting from SDG&E investments in local communities.
- SDG&E's plans for fire mitigation and prevention.
- The current and future maintenance of County access roads.
- If community involvement in construction mitigation plans is possible.
- Environmental impacts and related mitigation programs.
- Road closures along Alpine Boulevard during construction.
- Safety concerns, such as speeding, in local communities along the route.
- The potential to underground existing transmission lines as a part of this project.
- The location of specific towers and the proximity to homes and businesses.
- The use of eminent domain and the process of acquiring right-of-way for the project.
- The schedule of future meetings and if SDG&E can broker meetings with third parties.
- The timing, schedule and duration of construction.

Meeting Follow Up To Date

SDG&E has moved quickly to follow up on specific requests resulting from Council meetings. For example, members of the Lakeside Community Council requested more information about the location of towers and how SDG&E plans to coordinate with fire agencies. A follow up meeting with CAL FIRE, the Lakeside Fire Protection District, and SDG&E was scheduled and occurred.

In the Imperial Valley, members asked about the potential for SDG&E to hire local companies during the construction of the project to help offset the high unemployment in the region. SDG&E responded by scheduling and holding a Procurement and Business Enterprise workshop within 30 days. Over 80 people attended, representing a wide array of businesses throughout the region.

Further, the Alpine Community Council requested a second meeting to specifically address their questions and concerns about the process of underground work, given that portions of the Sunrise Powerlink will be placed under Alpine Boulevard. A second Community Council meeting in Alpine was held on December 15. SDG&E arranged a special presentation of this subject matter, which was headed by one of the company's experts in the field of undergrounding transmission lines. During this meeting, participants requested that SDG&E provide more detailed maps about the location of underground equipment. Those maps were delivered to the community.

Next Steps

Moving forward, each of the Community Councils expressed a desire to meet on a regular basis. In some cases, such as Alpine, this involves meeting on a monthly basis. Others, such as the City of San Diego, thought a quarterly meeting schedule was more appropriate. SDG&E continues to work with the members of each Council to ensure their questions and concerns are being addressed.
