**APPLICATION OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY (U 338-E) FOR
AUTHORIZATION TO RECOVER COSTS RELATED TO THE 2007 SOUTHERN
CALIFORNIA WIND AND FIRESTORMS RECORDED IN THE CATASTROPHIC
EVENT MEMORANDUM ACCOUNT**

I.

INTRODUCTION

Pursuant to California Public Utilities Code § 454.9, California Public Utilities Commission (Commission) Resolution E-3238, and Rules 2.1-2.3, and Rule 3.2 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, Southern California Edison Company (SCE) hereby submits this Application for authorization to recover costs related to the 2007 Southern California wind and firestorms recorded in its Catastrophic Event Memorandum Account (2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA). Specifically, SCE is requesting the Commission to:

(1) Find reasonable \$6.837 million of incremental Operations and Maintenance (O&M) expenses recorded in SCE's 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA O&M Cost Subaccount for the period October 21, 2007 through June 30, 2008;

(2) Authorize SCE to transfer the June 30, 2008 balance in the 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA O&M Cost Subaccount, plus accrued interest through the effective date of a final Commission decision in this proceeding, to the Distribution Subaccount of the Base Revenue Requirement Balancing Account (BRRBA) for recovery in distribution rates;

(3) Find reasonable \$9.487 million of incremental capital expenditures (which amount to \$5.546 million of capital additions¹) used as the basis for the revenue requirement recorded in SCE's 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA Capital Cost Subaccount;

(4) Authorize SCE to continue to record the monthly capital-related revenue requirement in the 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA Capital Cost Subaccount based on the wind and firestorm capital additions found reasonable in this proceeding until the effective date of a final Commission decision in SCE's 2012 General Rate Case (GRC) Phase 1 proceeding; and

(5) Authorize SCE to transfer the recorded balance in the 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA Capital Cost Subaccount, including interest, to the Distribution Subaccount of the BRRBA for recovery in distribution rates, upon the effective date of a final Phase 1 Commission decision in SCE's 2012 GRC proceeding.

II.

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY OF SCE'S REQUEST

A. Background

Beginning on October 20, 2007,² Southern California experienced a series of intense wind and firestorms. Between October and November 2007, 15 separate fires³ of various sizes in total burned over 148,000 acres in SCE's service area. Several of these fires burned tens of thousand of acres and almost half of them burned over 1,000 acres of land each. In addition, severe Santa Ana winds helped spread the fires, hamper fire fighting efforts, and caused severe

wind-related damage across the entire service area. Because of the high winds and wildfires, Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger issued two State of Emergency Proclamations (Emergency Proclamation). On October 21, 2007, Governor Schwarzenegger issued an Emergency Proclamation due to wildfires driven by dry conditions and high winds for seven counties including Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, Santa Barbara and Ventura.⁴ On November 2, 2007, Governor Schwarzenegger issued a second Emergency Proclamation for Riverside County due to the damage caused by extreme winds. On October 23, 2007, President George W. Bush declared that an emergency exists in California and on October 24, 2007 declared a major disaster to exist in the State of California and ordered federal aid to supplement state and local recovery efforts in areas “struck by wildfires beginning October 21, 2007, and continuing.”⁵

This series of severe wind and firestorms caused significant damage to the SCE system. In the areas included in the Emergency Proclamations, the storms disrupted electric service to approximately 246,000 customers and caused 123 momentary interruptions,⁶ 453 lockouts⁷ and 50 area outages.⁸ To repair the damage caused by the firestorms (and wind storms within Riverside County), SCE replaced 529 poles, 256 overhead services,⁹ 161 transformers, and 193,000 feet of overhead conductor in addition to a wide array of component parts (lightning arresters, switches, fuse holders, streetlight fixtures, etc.). In response to the initial outbreak of fires, SCE declared a Category 2 storm event on October 21, 2007. A Category 2 storm event is

declared when two or more of SCE's four geographic zones are affected by storm recovery efforts.¹⁰

In Resolution E-3238,¹¹ the Commission authorized SCE to establish a CEMA to record costs associated with: (1) restoring utility service to its customers; (2) repairing, replacing, or restoring damaged utility facilities; and (3) complying with governmental agency orders from declared disasters. In 1994, the requirements for recovery of reasonable costs recorded in the CEMA accounts were codified in Public Utilities Code section 454.9, which states:

(a) The commission shall authorize public utilities to establish catastrophic event memorandum accounts and to record in those accounts the costs of the following:

- (1) Restoring utility services to customers.
- (2) Repairing, replacing, or restoring damaged utility facilities.
- (3) Complying with governmental agency orders in connection with events declared disasters by competent state or federal authorities.

(b) The costs, including capital costs, recorded in the accounts set forth in subdivision (a) shall be recoverable in rates following a request by the affected utility, a commission finding of their reasonableness, and approval by the commission. The commission shall hold expedited proceedings in response to utility applications to recover costs associated with catastrophic events.

On October 31, 2007, SCE notified the Commission's Executive Director by letter that it activated its CEMA for the 2007 wind and firestorms, effective October 21, 2007 to "record its costs to restore service to customers and repair damage to its facilities resulting from the recent wind and firestorms in several counties throughout its service territory."¹² Upon the submittal of

the letter, SCE recorded its costs to restore service to its customers and repair damage to its facilities in its 2007 Wind and Fire Storm CEMA effective October 21, 2007.

Before including any costs in its 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA, SCE ensured that the costs were: (1) CPUC-jurisdictional; (2) incremental; (3) documented to be related to the 2007 wind and firestorms for which the Emergency Proclamations were made; and (4) reasonable. Consistent with Resolution E-3238 and Public Utilities Code section 454.9, SCE has recorded its incremental costs of restoring service to customers and repairing, replacing, or restoring facilities damaged by the 2007 wind and firestorms in its CEMA. As discussed in more detail in SCE's supporting testimony, only those costs incurred on or after October 21, 2007, which SCE determined to be CPUC-jurisdictional, incremental, storm-related, were incurred within the counties included in the Emergency Proclamations,¹³ and reasonable, have been recorded in SCE's 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA.

B. Summary of SCE's Requests

SCE seeks recovery for the costs incurred in response to the 2007 wind and firestorms in its service territory. Costs included in this Application are related to work performed from October 21, 2007 through June 30, 2008. In this Application and supporting testimony, SCE: (1) describes the extensive damage to SCE's infrastructure caused by these fires and high winds; (2) describes in detail the actions SCE took to respond to these wind and firestorms in order to restore service to its affected customers; (3) documents the incremental costs SCE incurred in restoring service and rebuilding its infrastructure; and (4) requests authority from the Commission to recover in rates the incremental firestorm-related costs recorded in its 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA.

If the Commission were to allocate the increase in annual revenues shown in Table II-1, above, to SCE's customer groups on a System Average Percentage Change basis, the impact on each customer group would be as shown in Table II-2, below. However, the increases shown in Table II-2 are illustrative only. SCE proposes that the revenue allocation and rate design

associated with the revenue requirement adopted in this proceeding be consolidated with other pending revenue changes in the rate consolidation proceeding following a decision in this proceeding. As shown in Table II-2, the percentage increase in SCE’s total revenue is less than one tenth of a percent.

C. Insurance Proceeds

At the time of the wind and firestorms, SCE’s property insurance excluded applicable overhead and underground transmission and distribution lines.¹⁴ Thus, SCE did not file an insurance claim for damage caused by the 2007 wind and firestorms to its facilities because associated equipment was not covered against losses by first party insurance policies and there was no insurance recovery for the wind and firestorms.

III.

STATUTORY AND REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

A. Statutory Authority

This Application is being made pursuant to Sections 451, 454.9, 701, 729, *et al.* of the Public Utilities Code of the State of California, Resolution E-3238, the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, and prior decisions, orders, and resolutions of this Commission.

B. Rule 2.1(c)

Rule 2.1(c) requires that applications shall state “[t]he proposed category for the proceeding, the need for hearing, the issues to be considered, and a proposed schedule.” These requirements are discussed below.

C. Proposed Categorization

SCE proposes to characterize this proceeding as “ratesetting,” as defined in Rule 1.3(e).

D. Need for Hearing and Proposed Schedule for Resolution of Issues

The need for hearings and the issues to be considered in such hearings will depend in large part on the degree to which other parties might contest SCE’s requests. At this time, SCE does not believe that approval of this Application will require hearings. However, in the event hearings are necessary, SCE’s proposed schedule is set forth below. Furthermore, Public Utilities Code Section 454.9(b) provides that the Commission “shall hold expedited proceedings in response to utility applications to recover costs associated with catastrophic events.” In this regard, SCE requests that the Commission adopt a final decision in response to this Application by no later than January 2011.

**IV.
CONCLUSION**

SCE respectfully requests an expeditious review and approval of this Application by the Commission and asks the Commission to issue a decision:

(1) Finding reasonable \$6.837 million of incremental Operations and Maintenance (O&M) expenses recorded in SCE's 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA O&M Subaccount for the period October 21, 2007 through June 30, 2008

(2) Authorizing SCE to transfer the June 30, 2008 balance in the 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA O&M Cost Subaccount, plus accrued interest through the effective date of a final Commission decision in this proceeding, to the Distribution Subaccount of the Base Revenue Requirement Balancing Account (BRRBA) for recovery in distribution rates;

(3) Finding reasonable \$9.487 million of incremental capital expenditures (which amount to \$5.546 million of capital additions)¹⁶ used as the basis for the revenue requirement recorded in SCE's 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA Capital Cost Subaccount;

(4) Authorizing SCE to continue to record the monthly capital-related revenue requirement in the 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA Capital Cost Subaccount based on the wind and firestorm capital additions found reasonable in this proceeding until the effective date of a final Commission decision in SCE's 2012 GRC Phase 1 proceeding;

(5) Authorizing SCE to transfer the recorded balance in the 2007 Wind and Firestorm CEMA Capital Cost Subaccount, including interest, to the Distribution Subaccount of the BRRBA for recovery in distribution rates, upon the effective date of a final 2012 GRC Phase 1 Commission decision.

(6) Rendering Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, and issuing orders consistent with the materials accompanying this Application; and,

(7) Granting such other relief as the Commission finds to be just and reasonable.
