To the service list of Rulemaking (R.) 17-06-024:

This ruling sets a due date of August 14, 2020 for new or revised Notices of Intent to seek intervenor compensation for the Phase II issues in this proceeding.

A second amended Scoping Memo and Ruling was issued June 2, 2020 to initiate Phase II of this proceeding and to consider the Commission's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The second amended Scoping Memo and Ruling did not mention any requirements related to intervenor compensation, precluding an opportunity for parties wishing to address the newly scoped issue of responses to the COVID-19 pandemic to request intervenor compensation. In accordance with Public Utilities Code section 1804(a)(1), I establish a due date for any parties wishing to do so to file a new or revised Notice of Intent to seek intervenor compensation for the Phase II issues within 30 days of today's Ruling.

Specifically, section 1804(a)(1) states:

In cases.....where new issues emerge subsequent to the time set for filing, the commission may determine an appropriate procedure for accepting new or revised notices of intent.

IT IS SO RULED THAT:

Any party wishing to file a new or revised Notice of Intent to claim intervenor compensation for the Phase II issues in this proceeding may do so by no later than August 14, 2020.
