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NOTICE OF COMPLIANCE WITH RULE 3.2(e)**

PacifiCorp, d/b/a Pacific Power (PacifiCorp or the Company), files this Notice of Compliance under Rule 3.2(e) of the California Public Utilities Commission (Commission) Rules of Practice and Procedure.¹ Rule 3.2(e) requires proof of compliance with the notice requirements of Rule 3.2 subsections (b), (c), and (d) within 20 days after compliance with the last of the applicable subsections for a rate increase. For Application 22-08-001 (Application), subsections (b), (c), and (d) apply. The Application was filed on August 1, 2022. The Company completed compliance with the last applicable subsections on September 7, 2022.

1. RULE 3.2(b)

Rule 3.2(b) requires an applicant to:

[S]erve notice to the following stating in general terms the proposed increases in rates or fares: (1) the Attorney General and the Department of General Services, when the State is a customer or subscriber whose rates or fares would be affected by the proposed increase; (2) the County Counsel (or District Attorney if the county has no County Counsel) and County Clerk, and the City Attorney and City Clerk, listed in the current Roster published by the Secretary of State in each county and city in which the proposed increase is to be made effective; and (3) any other persons whom

applicant deems appropriate or as may be required by the Commission.

The notice required by Rule 3.2(b) was served on August 19, 2022. Exhibit 1 to this Notice includes a copy of the notice letter sent to applicable Attorneys General, County Counsels, District Attorneys, County Clerks, City Attorneys, and City Clerks, as well as a list of the recipients of the letter.

2. RULE 3.2(c)

Rule 3.2(c) requires an applicant to:

[P]ublish at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the increases are proposed to be made effective a notice, in general terms, of the proposed increases in rates. Such notice shall state that a copy of said application and related exhibits may be examined at the offices of the California Public Utilities Commission in San Francisco and in such offices of the applicant as are specified in the notice, and shall state the locations of such offices. Applicants shall maintain documentation of compliance with this subsection, and shall provide it to any person upon request.

The notice must be published within 20 days after filing an application to increase rates.

Notices were published as required by Rule 3.2(c) in several newspapers of general circulation the Del Norte Triplicate, Modoc County Record, Siskiyou Daily News, and the Mount Shasta Area Herald. Exhibits 2, 3, 4, and 5 to this Notice are proof of publication for these newspapers and a copy of each notice published.

3. RULE 3.2(d)

Rule 3.2(d) requires an applicant to:

[F]urnish to its customers affected by the proposed increase notice of its application either by electronically linking to such notice for customers that receive their bills electronically or, for customers that receive their bills by mail, by mailing such notice postage prepaid or including such notice with the regular bill. The notice shall state the amount of the proposed rate change expressed in both dollar and percentage terms for the entire rate change as well as for each customer classification, a brief statement of the reasons the change

is required or sought, and the mailing, and if available, the e-mail address of the Commission to which any customer inquiries may be directed regarding how to participate in, or receive further notices regarding the date, time, and place of any hearing on the application, and the mailing address of the corporation to which any customer inquiries may be directed.

Because the Company operates on a 30-day billing cycle, Rule 3.2(d) requires customer notice within 45 days after filing an application to increase rates.

The Company included the notice with each customer's regularly mailed bill from August 6, 2022, through September 7, 2022, which was within 45 days after the date of the Application. For customers receiving bills electronically, the Company sends an e-mail notification when the bill is available for viewing online. Once the customer logs in to their account, they can see a notification on the online bill account links to an online message where bill inserts are listed for the current month. The Company sent the notice required by Rule 3.2(d) to customers electronically by making the bill insert associated with the Application available online in each customer's account. Exhibit 6 to this Notice is a copy of the bill insert mailed or made electronically available to customers.

4. RULE 3.2(e)

Rule 3.2(e) requires an applicant to file proof of compliance with the notice requirements of Rule 3.2(b), (c), and (d) within 20 days after compliance with the last of the applicable subsections. The Company complied with the last of the applicable subsections on September 7, 2022. Proof of compliance is provided in Attachment A, which is an affidavit of Zachary Rogala incorporating the following exhibits:

WHY AM I RECEIVING THIS NOTICE?

On August 1, 2022, Pacific Power filed an application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting an overall increase to electric rates. This application will address the Energy Cost Adjustment Clause (ECAC), greenhouse gas (GHG) allowance costs, and the California Climate Credit.

If this application is approved, this would result in a rate increase of \$14.5 million or 13.6%, effective January 1, 2023. This will impact your monthly bill.

WHY IS PACIFIC POWER REQUESTING THIS RATE INCREASE?

- Annually, Pacific Power compares actual and forecast costs of providing electricity to customers (ECAC rate) and the costs of purchasing GHG allowances to comply with the California Cap and Trade program, established as part of the state's Global Warming Solutions Act (GHG rate).
- The ECAC rate allows Pacific Power to recover costs related to producing electricity such as fuel expenses, power purchased from third parties, and energy transmission expenses. This application requests an ECAC rate increase of \$3.8 million due to power costs being more than the amount of revenue collected in current rates to cover those costs.
- The GHG rate allows Pacific Power the opportunity to recover costs related to purchasing allowances to comply with the state's Cap and Trade program. This application requests a GHG rate increase of \$10.7 million due to actual allowance costs being higher than previously forecasted.
- This application also requests approval for Pacific Power customers to receive the California Climate Credit on their bills, resulting from the sale of greenhouse gas allowances. If approved, residential and small business customers will receive a credit of \$268.56 twice, in April and October 2023.

This application will be reviewed by the CPUC to determine if the costs are reasonable and eligible for recovery from customers before any rate increase is potentially approved.

HOW COULD THIS AFFECT MY MONTHLY ELECTRIC RATES?

If Pacific Power's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average residential monthly bill using 850 kWh per month would increase by approximately \$17.29 or 13.5% per month in 2023. A summary of the estimated rate impact is provided below. This table does not include the Climate Credit which will be provided to customers.

HOW DOES THE REST OF THIS PROCESS WORK?

This application will be assigned to a CPUC administrative law judge who will consider proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The administrative law judge will issue a proposed decision that may adopt Pacific Power's application, modify it or deny it. Any CPUC commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision with a different outcome. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC commissioners at a public voting meeting.

Parties to the proceeding are currently reviewing Pacific Power's application, including the Public Advocates Office, which is an independent consumer advocate within the CPUC that represents customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. 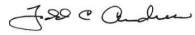

mechanical and workshop experiences back home has helped me learn and understand many of the Navy’s operations and missions,” said Montecillo.

Listen for this bird in Northern California's conifer forests

Bird Words

If you have entered the world of the conifers above the Sacramento Valley, or throughout most of North America for that matter, you stand a good chance of having heard an ongoing nasal “ankh, ankh, ankh, ankh.” It’s the song of the red-breasted nuthatches, elfin birds of our pines and firs. They’re harder to see than hear. They don’t seem shy, but they’re small and much of their living happens far over our heads. Nuthatches are built for prying insects from the bark of trees. Their bill is slightly dishd upward and stout enough to shovel bugs from crevice hideaways. Their shoulders are broad, relatively speaking, and provide the heft to wield their strong bills. Their long hind toe is used, uniquely in the bird world, to hold them in place while they hunt face-down on a tree trunk or branch. Their tails are stiff, allowing them to prop against a tree as they pound against it. And what do they pound? In addition to picking insects from cracks in tree trunks, these nuthatches gather seeds from cones at branch-tips. They often wedge hard pine-nuts into crannies in the bark and then crack them open with hammer blows from their bills. Also, these versatile gym-

nasts, like woodpeckers, carve out their own cavities for nesting. No fools, they prefer the softer wood of dead limbs and snags for their home-building. Males often begin several nesting holes as part of their courting behavior. A female takes over and shapes the chosen cavity to her liking, taking about two weeks to complete the excavation. Both adults apply sap to the hole entrance. The male on the exterior, the female on the interior. The tiny nuthatches dive right through the hole without getting gummed up, but predators including owls to ants can be deterred by the sticky goo. The male begins feeding the female, and she lays a handful of eggs in their nest. The young hatch, naked and blind, after two weeks of incubation. Another two weeks and, having been fed and protected by both parents, the young fledge into the world. If you enter that world of the conifers you may be able to see them. A little luck and a good pair of binoculars will let you enjoy the red-breasted nuthatch’s gray-blue back, chestnut underside, and black eyeline under a white eyebrow. Otherwise, at least you may enjoy their ubiquitous song: “Ankh, ankh, ankh.” Go to wintuaudubon.org for local birding programs and a schedule of activities open to the public.

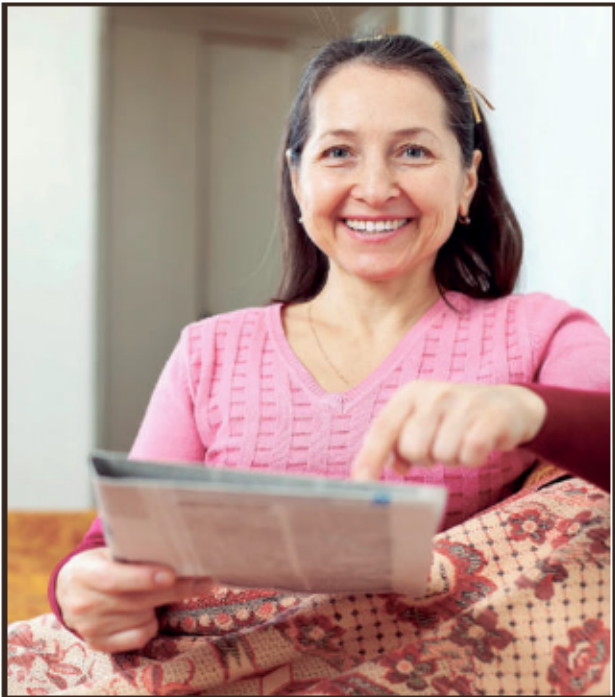

Application (A.22-08-001)

WHY AM I RECEIVING THIS NOTICE?

On August 1, 2022, Pacific Power filed an application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting an overall increase to electric rates. This application addressed the Energy Cost Adjustment Clause (ECAC), greenhouse gas (GHG) allowance costs, and the California Climate Credit.

If this application is approved, this would result in a rate increase of \$14.5 million or 13.6%, effective January 1, 2023. This will impact your monthly bill.

WHY IS PACIFIC POWER REQUESTING THIS RATE INCREASE?

- Annually, Pacific Power compares actual and forecast costs of providing electricity to customers (ECAC rate) and the costs of purchasing GHG allowances to comply with the California Cap and Trade program, established as part of the state's Global Warming Solutions Act (GHG rate).
- The ECAC rate allows Pacific Power to recover costs related to producing electricity such as fuel expenses, power purchased from third parties, and energy transmission expenses. This application requests an ECAC rate increase of \$3.8 million due to power costs being more than the amount of revenue collected in current rates to cover those costs.
- The GHG rate allows Pacific Power the opportunity to recover costs related to purchasing allowances to comply with the state's Cap and Trade program. This application requests a GHG rate increase of \$10.7 million due to actual allowance costs being higher than previously forecasted.
- This application also requests approval for Pacific Power customers to receive the California Climate Credit on their bills, resulting from the sale of greenhouse gas allowances. If approved, residential and small business customers will receive a credit of \$268.56 twice, in April and October 2023.

This application will be reviewed by the CPUC to determine if the costs are reasonable and eligible for recovery from customers before any rate increase is potentially approved.

HOW COULD THIS AFFECT MY MONTHLY ELECTRIC RATES?

If Pacific Power's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average residential monthly bill using 850 kWh per month would increase by approximately \$17.29 or 13.5% per month in 2023. A summary of the estimated rate impact is provided

below. This table does not include the Climate Credit which will be provided to customers.

HOW DOES THE REST OF THIS PROCESS WORK?

This application will be assigned to a CPUC Administrative Law Judge who will consider proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The Administrative Law Judge will issue a proposed decision that may adopt Pacific Power's application, modify it, or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision with a different outcome. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners at a public CPUC Voting Meeting.
