**REPORT OF SAN DIEGO GAS & ELECTRIC COMPANY (U 902 G)  
ON VIRTUAL SENATE BILL 1221 INFORMATION SESSION**

Pursuant to Ordering Paragraph (OP) 5 of Decision (D.) 25-12-042, San Diego Gas & Electric Company (SDG&E) hereby submits its report on the virtual Senate Bill (SB) 1221 information session it conducted on March 9, 2026. On December 23, 2025, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC or Commission) issued D.25-12-042 designating initial priority neighborhood decarbonization zones pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 662(a). The Decision directed the gas utilities to host and record one virtual SB 1221 information session to hear comments in support of or opposition to the designation of zones and solicit feedback on SB 1221 diversity and equity considerations.<sup>1</sup>

Additionally, OP 5 of D.25-12-042 directed gas utilities to file and serve a report by April 1, 2026, with the following reporting requirements:

- (1) which tribal representatives, representatives from Load Serving Entities, and community organizations received the fact sheet;
- (2) an attestation that the fact sheet was provided to a Director of Planning, Community Development, Housing, or similar department in every city and county in their service territory where the Gas Corporation identified a foreseeable pipeline replacement project;
- (3) any and all community organizations and local governments that expressed interest in participating in Senate Bill 1221's decarbonization opportunities;

- (4) any and all feedback the Gas Corporation received regarding Senate Bill 1221's diversity and equity considerations;
- (5) the date, time, and link to a recording of the virtual information session;
- (6) documentation that the information session was properly noticed;
- (7) the Gas Corporation's proposal for continuing community outreach efforts beyond April 1, 2026; and
- (8) the Gas Corporation's recommendation for census tracts to be included in the decarbonization zone update.

Pursuant to these Commission directives, SDG&E submits its virtual SB 1221 information session report as Attachment A hereto.

## **VIRTUAL SENATE BILL (SB) 1221 INFORMATION SESSION REPORT OF SAN DIEGO GAS & ELECTRIC COMPANY**

On December 23, 2025, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC or Commission) issued Decision (D.) 25-12-042 designating initial priority neighborhood decarbonization zones pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 662(a). The Decision directed the gas utilities to host and record one virtual Senate Bill (SB) 1221 information session to hear comments in support or opposition to the designation of zones and solicit feedback on SB1221 diversity and equity considerations.<sup>2</sup>

On March 9, 2026, San Diego Gas & Electric Company (SDG&E), pursuant to Ordering Paragraph (OP) 5 of D.25-12-042, hosted a two-hour virtual Information Session to receive public comments regarding the Priority Neighborhood Decarbonization Zones and the SB 1221 Program. During the session, 34 comments were heard, in which 25 members of the public expressed opposition to the implementation of SB1221, specifically the removal of their gas service, and three expressed support for decarbonization zones and pilots. Six members of the public voiced neutral opinion such as by citing overall support of clean energy sources and their benefits, while also recognizing the importance of understanding the costs to not only implement pilots, but also customer bill impacts. Several neutral commenters also discussed the benefits of retaining diverse energy sources and the cost burden to abandon existing infrastructure. Overall, commenters shared the opinion that there is not enough information at this time regarding the benefit both to the public and California's energy infrastructure as a whole to weigh in definitively on the program.

Additionally, commenters raised concerns regarding electric grid reliability, system resiliency, and the preservation of customer energy choice, emphasizing that these considerations

should remain central to any neighborhood decarbonization pilot implemented pursuant to SB1221. A recurring issue raised by speakers reflected skepticism that the electric grid can reliably support the expanded electrical load from neighborhood electrification given recurring experiences with heat related strain, wildfire related Public Safety Power Shutoffs, localized outages, and growing demand from electric vehicles and data centers. Commenters also highlighted the resiliency benefits of the gas system, noting its ability to provide uninterrupted heating, cooking, and hot water during electric outages and extreme weather events. Some speakers cautioned that eliminating gas service could reduce overall energy system resilience, particularly for medically vulnerable customers and communities experiencing frequent outages. Participants further underscored the importance of maintaining customer choice and fuel diversity, arguing that access to both gas and electric service provides an essential hedge against reliability risks, cost volatility, and unforeseen system disruptions. Overall, the public input reflected a strong concern that overreliance on a single energy source could increase exposure to reliability risks and reduce customers' ability to manage energy needs safely, affordably, and resiliently.

Leading up to the Information Session and thereafter, SDG&E received nearly 30 emails about SB1221 and the priority neighborhood decarbonization zones. One (1) email voiced support of SB1221 and 12 voiced opposition. 13 individuals were neutral, requesting more information about the program or support in accessing the SB1221 maps.

The remainder of this report addresses each item outlined in OP 5 of D.25-12-042.

**(1) Which tribal representatives, representatives from Load Serving Entities, and community organizations received the fact sheet;**

On Thursday, February 19, SDG&E noticed, via email, the March 9 public Information Session to four stakeholder groups, as outlined by D.25-12-042. These groups include Tribal Representatives, municipal staff in relevant City departments, Community Based Organizations, and Load Serving Entities. In its email noticing the Information Session, SDG&E included a link to

Public Advocates Office's (PAO) Fact Sheet. Additional context on SB1221 was also provided in the email communication with the Fact Sheet.

SDG&E leveraged the California Native American Heritage Commission's (NAHC) database and sent PAO's SB1221 Fact Sheet to Tribes within its service territory that were provided in NAHC's database. For a complete list of Tribes receiving the Fact Sheet, please see Attachment 1.

- (2) An attestation that the fact sheet was provided to a Director of Planning, Community Development, Housing, or similar department in every city and county in their service territory where the Gas Corporation identified a foreseeable pipeline replacement project;**

A copy of the PAO Fact Sheet was provided to at least one contact at each City and County receiving gas service from SDG&E. To ensure delivery of notice to the proper contacts, SDG&E personnel involved in organizing the information session consulted with government affairs managers to identify persons in representative departments, as outlined in the decision. Contacts included City representatives from Planning, Community Development, Housing, Sustainability, and similar departments. An attestation that the fact sheet was provided as directed is attached hereto as Attachment 2.

- (3) Any and all community organizations and local governments that expressed interest in participating in Senate Bill 1221's decarbonization opportunities;**

To ensure broad awareness of the SB1221 program and PNDZ development, SDG&E provided notice of its Information Session and provide the Fact Sheet to a broad group of Community Based Organizations. SDG&E included Community Based Organizations that provide support to disadvantaged, low-income and ESJ communities, in which SDG&E has previously partnered.

SDG&E did not receive any written interest in SB1221 opportunities prior to the Information Session. However, during its March 9 Information Session, the San Diego Building Electrification Coalition provided public comment expressing interest, stating they "strongly

support locating neighborhood decarbonization pilots in our region and stand ready to support local governments, SDG&E and our community to make them successful.” No local governments provided public comment during the Information Session. However, on March 20, SDG&E, at the request of external parties, participated in a meeting with San Diego County representatives to discuss the program and the County’s interest. Additional meeting attendees included representatives of the San Diego Building Electrification Coalition and Building Power Resource Center.

SDG&E received two requests from the public via email for addresses to be included in future Priority Neighborhood Decarbonization Zones:

- A resident of Lakeside (Eucalyptus Hills), California, would like their neighborhood to be considered as a PNDZ.
- A resident of Zone SDC-0433 wishes their neighborhood be considered as a PNDZ.

**(4) Any and all feedback the Gas Corporations received regarding Senate Bill 1221’s diversity and equity considerations;**

SDG&E provides a summary of comments received during the Information Session as well as through the SB1221 Mailbox (SB1221Maps@semprautilities.com) as relating to diversity and equity considerations.

In general, the public comments SDG&E received consistently emphasized that affordability considerations are central to the viability and equity of any neighborhood decarbonization pilot implemented pursuant to SB1221. Commenters expressed concern that the potential costs associated with electrification - including electrical service upgrades, rewiring of older homes, appliance replacement, solar system modifications, and possible displacement during construction - may impose disproportionate burdens on certain customer segments. Speakers highlighted risks to

low and moderate-income households, seniors on fixed incomes, renters, residents with older homes, and individuals with medical or disability-related needs, noting that these customers often have limited financial capacity to absorb large upfront expenses or ongoing increases in electric bills. Multiple participants further observed that some affected customers may not qualify for existing assistance programs, raising concerns that decarbonization pilots could unintentionally exacerbate energy affordability challenges or housing instability.

Public comments also raised equity concerns among customers, particularly with respect to geographic targeting and the distribution of costs and benefits. Participants questioned whether it would be equitable for certain neighborhoods, often characterized as renter heavy, working class, or historically underserved to face higher individual costs or reduced energy choice while broader system benefits may accrue over time to utilities or to customers outside pilot areas. Several commenters emphasized the need for clear cost protections, transparent funding mechanisms, accessible outreach, and explicit safeguards to ensure that disadvantaged populations, customers with limited digital access or language barriers, and those with health related energy needs are not adversely impacted. Overall, the feedback underscored that affordability and equity will be paramount considerations in program design and implementation and should be addressed comprehensively to maintain public trust and avoid uneven impacts across customer groups.

SDG&E did not receive public written comment during the virtual Information Session concerning diversity and equity considerations; however, SDG&E is providing the written feedback and comments received online during the virtual SB1221 information session attached hereto as Attachment 3.

**(5) Date, time, and link to a recording of the virtual information session;**

SDG&E's virtual information session was held on Monday, March 9, 2026, from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.(PST). The recording of the virtual information session is here: <https://youtu.be/XRDun833kf8>

**(6) Documentation that the information session was properly noticed;**

- PAO approval of the SDG&E prepared notice occurred on February 9, 2026.
- SDG&E also obtained PAO review of the list of locations where the approved notice will be circulated via newspaper on February 13, 2026.
- SDG&E does not have branch offices.

**(7) Gas Corporation's proposal for continuing community outreach efforts beyond April 1, 2026;**

Prior to the development of programmatic details, SDG&E's active monitoring of the email inbox (sb1221maps@semprautilities.com) for questions, comments, and feedback will continue. The SB1221 microsite on SDG&E.com will be active, which in turn directs visitors to the California Public Utilities Commission website for comments on the proceeding docket.

When programmatic details are defined or more developed, SDG&E will update design and cost-effectiveness information on its website, thus providing further clarity to many of the public's interests and questions.

Additionally, SDG&E's Regional Public Affairs (RPA) department will continue to discuss SB1221 while engaging with key, external stakeholders, including but not limited to, elected officials, municipal staff in Planning, Community Development, Housing, and similar departments, and other relevant city staff. Similarly, follow-up conversations will be conducted with Tribes, Load Serving Entities, and identified Community Based Organizations. In such conversations, SDG&E representatives will rely on the Fact Sheet provided by PAO and encourage stakeholders to provide feedback and comments in R.24-09-012. SDG&E will continue to monitor all inquiries directed to the email address given when soliciting participation in the Information Session and distributing the Fact Sheet. SDG&E emphasized during the Information Session and reiterates here its belief that,

until program design details are finalized, numerous outstanding questions remain with respect to the Utilities' implementation and the questions and concerns raised by members of the public. Finally, SDG&E also notes its view that a proper funding recovery mechanism must be established to support the utility's continued work of hosting information sessions and the substantial outreach efforts that will be required around the PNDZs.

**(8) Gas Corporation's recommendation for census tracts to be included in the decarbonization zone update.**

SDG&E suggests that future modifications to PNDZs will be more informed, both from a community input and project viability perspective, once the SB1221 program design details are established and understood; SDG&E reserves the right to provide input on new zone recommendations at such time. Given that, SDG&E has informed the Commission via this report the following PNDZ designation requests shared during the public comments section of our March 2026 Information Session.

## SB 1221 Neighborhood Decarbonization Program Design Upcoming Information Sessions and Program

The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) is seeking public input on what neighborhoods to define as “priority neighborhood decarbonization zones” (decarbonization zones), with a particular focus on equity. Decarbonization zones are geographic areas in which the CPUC may focus cost-effective building decarbonization programs. Gas utilities will host information sessions this spring, and public input from those sessions will inform the CPUC as it updates the zones later this year. The upcoming neighborhood decarbonization pilot program is likely to focus on cost-effective home electrification for selected neighborhoods located within these zones.

### Background: Neighborhood Decarbonization Pilot Projects Directed by SB 1221

In Senate Bill (SB) 1221, adopted in 2024, the California Legislature recognized that natural gas use in residential buildings contributes to California’s greenhouse gas emissions. The Legislature also noted that cost-effective, zero-emission alternatives to pipeline replacement projects can reduce gas system costs, which are paid by gas customers. As such, SB 1221 authorizes the CPUC to approve up to 30 pilot projects that facilitate cost-effective decarbonization in priority neighborhood decarbonization zones, constituting up to 1 percent of each utility’s customers. The CPUC may only approve locations that receive consent from at least 67 percent of property owners with natural gas service in the project boundary area. Projects where all customers consent do not count towards the 30-project limit. If a project is successfully implemented, SB 1221 gives the CPUC authority to relieve the gas utility of its obligation to provide natural gas service to the project area.

### Background: Priority Neighborhood Decarbonization Zones

Priority neighborhood decarbonization zones are geographic areas defined by the CPUC to target neighborhood decarbonization pilot projects in places where they will be most beneficial and cost-effective. Not all zones will receive decarbonization pilot projects, and decarbonization locations are expected to be much smaller than zones. Being in a zone can mean being prioritized for cost-effective projects to replace gas appliances.

To request a zone in your area, file a comment at <https://apps.cpuc.ca.gov/c/R2409012> that includes the 11-digit census tract numbers requested and the organization making the request. For more detailed directions, see <https://www.cpuc.ca.gov/industries-and-topics/natural-gas/sb-1221-implementation/consideration-for-a-neighborhood-decarbonization-zone>. The CPUC will take these requests into consideration when updating zones.



### **Zone Designation to Date and Requesting Zones**

In December 2025, the CPUC designated initial zones by 2020 census tract using the following criteria:

- a local government or organization requested to participate, and also
- 10 percent or more of the gas distribution main pipelines in the area are expected to be replaced by the gas utility in the coming decade, reflecting the potential opportunity for cost savings.

Initial zones were also capped at 25 tracts per county, except that census tracts with high CalEnviroScreen scores (reflecting disadvantaged communities)<sup>1</sup> were not subjected to the cap. This process resulted in 151 census tracts designated as initial zones statewide. The CPUC anticipates adding to or revising these zone designations by December 31, 2026, and may do so earlier.

### **Spring 2026 Utility-Hosted Information Sessions**

The CPUC has directed PG&E, SoCalGas, SDG&E, and Southwest Gas to each host and record one virtual SB 1221 information session for government representatives, community organizations, and members of the public in their service territory between January 15 and March 15, 2026. The purpose of these sessions is to hear comments related to the designation of decarbonization zones in specific areas and to solicit feedback on SB 1221's equity considerations. These considerations include the ability of homes and small businesses in the community to access heating and/or cooling, local environmental hazards, health considerations, and community barriers to decarbonization. Gas utilities will provide links to these sessions on their SB 1221 webpages and will record them and post the recordings to their webpages. Translation services will be provided as needed. Gas utilities will summarize the information sessions in a report due to the CPUC by April 1, 2026.

### **After These Information Sessions, What Happens Next?**

The intent of the information sessions report is to inform revisions to the decarbonization zones. The CPUC will update the zones by December 31, 2026, and may do so earlier. By July 1, 2026, the CPUC will adopt the SB 1221 neighborhood decarbonization pilot program requirements, including a process for gas corporations to determine and submit pilot projects for approval. After the CPUC establishes the program requirements, gas utilities may propose potential pilot projects for approval.

### **B.K.**

I agree with many of the overwhelming comments that are \*not\* in favor of going electric. What about Core Transport Agent Utility Choice of Gas for those on SDGE and / or other Competition to the State for Gas to give us end users a choice to stay with Gas ? Secondly, with this overwhelming responses for those that do not to change and cannot afford the expenses to change (i.e. out of pocket expenses to change all of house from gas to electric to gas plus buying to appliances). Plus the increased rates monthly and yearly. This seems like a dictatorship not a choice.

### **L.O.**

I am in Chula Vista in a single family residence. When solar people were going house to house, besides the fact that I can not afford it, my SDG&E bill was \$50.00 per month so I was not interested. Since then, my husband passed away and there is only me. I was raised with "when you leave a room, turn out the light". While watching TV the only light that is on is by my chair. I only wash clothes and dishes after 9pm and my bill is now \$100+. Having to rely solely on electric and I will have to give up other needed items in order to pay my utilities.

In the 50's-70's Golden Medallion Homes were being pushed forward as all electric. The result was that the utility costs were prohibitive and many of the homes were retrofitted to gas.

I personally resent not being given a choice, but forced to convert.

I am strongly opposed to the proposal which has not really been thought through and has not taken into consideration the economic burden on the average citizen in California.

Attendees need to remember that this topic is about implementation of existing law (1221) which was passed by our legislature. You can't oppose 1221 but you can oppose how it's implemented and provide details on how electrification will cost significantly more than pipeline replacement.

The CPUC has issued initial decarbonization zones (see Decision 25-12-042) but plans on updating the decarbonization zones by December 31, 2026, and is interested in additional public input to inform this update.

This virtual event will allow you to provide your opinion on which neighborhoods should be designated decarbonization zones for possible future projects. Your input on local environmental hazards, access to heating and cooling, health considerations, community barriers to decarbonization, and diversity and equity considerations is also sought.
