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ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE MATHEWS: The Commission will come to order.

Good morning. Today is Wednesday, July 13th, 2026. And this is just the time and place for a quick telephonic status conference in Application 25-02-004, the Application of the North American Numbering Plan Administrator on Behalf of the California Telecommunications Industry for Relief of the 626 Numbering Plan Area.

My name is Suman Mathews. And I am the administrative law judge assigned to this proceeding. And Commissioner Matthew Baker is the assigned commissioner to this proceeding.

Let's just go ahead and quickly take the appearances of the attendants today. For the record, could you go ahead and quickly speak your name and spell your name again for the record and for the court reporter?

Go ahead, Ms. Miller.

MS. MILLER: Yes. This is Kimberly Miller, M-i-l-l-e-r. And I'm representing the North American Numbering Plan Administrator, also known as NANPA.

1 And with me today is Florence Weber, W-e-b --
2 just one B -- b-e-r. And it's -- she's the director of
3 the NANPA.

4 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay. Thank you.

5 And, Mr. Culver, do you want to go ahead and
6 give your name for the record as well?

7 MR. CULVER: Sure. It's Ian, that's I-a-n,
8 Culver, C-u-l-v-e-r. And I'm with the Commission in the
9 Legal Division.

10 ALJ MATHEWS: All right. Thank you.

11 The purpose of today's status conference is
12 just to advise the parties of the Commission's tentative
13 position on this proceeding. As we know, the -- NANPA
14 filed its application in February 2025, with a projected
15 exhaust date of Q4 2027 for the projected exhaust date
16 of the November 21, 2025, NANPA filed a supplement,
17 which gave an updated projected exhaust date of Q1 2029
18 for the 626 NPA. And then just recently, in April of
19 2026, NANPA filed another update or supplement giving a
20 projected exhaust date of the 626 NPA out in Q1 of 2030,
21 which is about less than four years of where we are
22 today.

23 And so, as with Application 24-05-011, the
24 Commission intends to dismiss the proceeding without
25 prejudice due to the fact that the roughly four-year

1 time span until exhaustion is just simply too long to
2 warrant keeping the proceeding open for various reasons
3 that affect the Commission and how its -- how it manages
4 its proceedings. So, the rationale is -- for the
5 dismissal, is just solely due to the fact that the
6 exhaust- -- exhaustion date is so far out and not due to
7 any material or structural issues with the application.
8 Once the issue of exhaustion is ripe, the Commission can
9 then move the proceeding forward very quickly.

10 So given that the Commission's intent to
11 dismiss the application without prejudice is the plan
12 going forward, I just wanted to determine if NANPA would
13 be willing to waive the comment period in this case.
14 Since NANPA is the only party to the proceeding, if
15 NANPA is willing to waive the comment period, then the
16 Commission would issue the dismissal without comment.
17 So, I wanted to just hear from NANPA on this issue.

18 Ms. Miller, would you like to provide any
19 comment and, also, advise whether NANPA would be willing
20 to waive the comment period?

21 MS. MILLER: Okay. Yes, your Honor.

22 First, I would like to ask if the Commission
23 would consider suspending the proceeding, as opposed to
24 a dismissal? Because there has been a lot of work done
25 by NANPA and the industry and, indeed, the Commission

1 staff in this proceeding. And we would, you know, like
2 to avoid a situation where we might have to duplicate
3 all those efforts again.

4 And, also, just to shed some light on the
5 exhaust date: It's not static. And, you know, it --
6 depending on demand from the industry for numbers, that
7 exhaust date could move forward or back again. So given
8 the time and effort that's already been put into this
9 proceeding, we thought we would recommend to the
10 Commission to suspend. And then when we get closer to
11 time to begin relief again, and we can consult with the
12 Commission on that as well, we could move to -- move it
13 out of suspension.

14 ALJ MATHEWS: So, I know that came up in the
15 last proceeding, when the comments did come in after --
16 that came up in the A.24-05-011 proceeding after the
17 dismissal was issued. I would like to know why the
18 suspension is preferred. Does it have to do with the
19 filing fee?

20 Or in the case of A.24-05-011, it looks like
21 what you are seeking in that case is -- or that
22 proceeding -- is that the Commission waived the
23 requirements for certain events to be repeated. So,
24 you're going -- and I believe the Commission had
25 discussed the possibility of certain events that have

1 already been completed, with respect to A.24-05-011,
2 will be -- will be deemed completed for the purpose of
3 the new proceeding for the 657714 NPA proceeding, the
4 new one. So why in this case would you not be able to,
5 you know, follow that same route?

6 Like, why are you seeking suspension -- Or
7 what's the advantage to you of suspension versus
8 refiling?

9 MS. MILLER: We would need to kick off relief
10 again. And, you know, if things stand as they are,
11 again we would need kick off relief again in first
12 quarter of 2027, if dismissed.

13 And, Ms. Weber, I think you could maybe shed
14 some light on all the work that the industry and NANPA
15 does leading up to the filing of an extension or
16 application in this case.

17 MS. WEBER: Yes. So, we have to kick off
18 relief 36 months prior to the projected exhaust date,
19 which would require NANPA to convene the industry to
20 determine what the relief plan would be; and in this
21 case, an overlay. And then we would refile a new
22 application in support of relief for the 626 NPA.

23 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay. When you --

24 MS. WEBER: And what we're trying to avoid
25 is -- oh, sorry.

1 ALJ MATHEWS: No, go ahead. Go ahead --

2 (Crosstalk.)

3 MS. WEBER: Yeah. I mean, that's pretty much
4 the reason why we're requesting the suspension, rather
5 than the dismissal. Just to avoid any additional work
6 both by the Commission staff, the industry, as well as
7 NANPA. And it's really just duplicating the work that's
8 already been done, with the exception of showing what
9 the new exhaust date would be in the 626 NPA. But
10 relief would still be needed.

11 ALJ MATHEWS: But when you say, "Kick off
12 relief again," what does that entail exactly?

13 MS. WEBER: That means we would gather the
14 industry, as well as Commission staff, hold a meeting,
15 refile a brand new application -- so we would take the
16 application, modify it based on the information as it
17 stands at that time, and then review it with the
18 industry, and then file accordingly. And it's similar
19 to what we did for the 657714 proceeding.

20 ALJ MATHEWS: In that proceeding, did you have
21 to kick off relief again? Or were some of those -- was
22 that -- was that event deemed completed for purposes of
23 the new proceeding, because you had done it for the old
24 proceeding?

25 MS. WEBER: We kicked off relief again for that

1 proceeding. And we requested at that time for the
2 activities that took place, based on the industry, if
3 that could carry over to the new application. And that
4 would be the ask here as well, for 626, if this
5 application was dismissed.

6 MS. MILLER: Yeah. And that includes
7 notifications that have already gone out to consumers.
8 And I think the industry, as soon as an application is
9 filed like this, they put notifications in their bill
10 inserts and things like that. So, we feel like it would
11 help reduce customer confusion.

12 (Reporter clarification.)

13 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay. Yeah.

14 So, the competing interests from the Commission
15 for -- state-side is -- as far as I -- what I'm
16 understanding is that, you know, the -- the legislature
17 or the -- yeah. The state, as far as proceedings being
18 open for multiple years like this, is disfavored and is
19 also something that's not necessarily the process or
20 protocol that's followed at the Commission. So that
21 is -- that is the concern of something that is open for
22 four years -- a four-year period, like this. So when
23 the applications kept coming in -- or the supplemental
24 applications or amendments kept coming in, pushing the
25 exhaust date out by, you know, two years then another

1 year beyond that where we're at a four-year period
2 beyond that current date, then that's a concern from a
3 resource and managerial standpoint, from the
4 Commission's perspective, and how operations are run at
5 our level. So, that's the competing, you know, interest
6 or factors from the Commission's and commissioner's
7 standpoint that I would have to discuss with the
8 commissioner.

9 But just to be clear, I want to understand --
10 so as far as -- you know, we have this similar situation
11 with A.24-05-011, which is now closed. The 657714 NPA,
12 that was dismissed without prejudice. You -- NANPA
13 re-filed that as Application 26-03-026 just recently.
14 You re-filed that application.

15 And in that application, that -- the
16 A.24-05-011 was dismissed without prejudice, because the
17 exhaust date was too far out in the future. At that
18 time, it was filed. When you re-filed A.26-03-026, just
19 this year, you asked for certain activities or events to
20 be waived that you had already completed in the old
21 proceeding in A.24-05-011.

22 So why is that something you could not ask for
23 again, is what I want to understand or be clear about?

24 MS. MILLER: We can ask for that again. It
25 does still require some duplicative efforts on our part.

1 But we understand that there are competing interests,
2 you know, as you just outlined for the Commission. But,
3 you know, because it happened for the first time in that
4 case you just referenced, you know, there was some
5 uncertainty on our part as to whether the Commission
6 would be able to grant such relief. And now we
7 understand, you know, that you can. So as long as you
8 foresee that being an acceptable way to move forward, I
9 think we can accept that.

10 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay. Because, again, I have to
11 balance -- or the Commission -- and that -- you know,
12 the commissioner has to balance the needs of the
13 Commission, with respect to a proceeding being
14 considered dormant on the docket for multiple years,
15 which this -- which this might be, if it's got a date
16 that doesn't -- that -- with an exhaust date that's out
17 in 2030, and we're in 2026 only.

18 So, that's what I would have to raise with the
19 commissioner. But it is a -- so I'm looking at the
20 application for A.26-03-026. And here, NANPA has
21 written that:

22 The industry requests that as part of the
23 approval for this plan, that the Commission
24 waive, to the extent necessary, the need to
25 complete activities that were completed as part

1 of the requirements in A.24-05-011, which we've
2 dismissed without prejudice in December 2025,
3 because requiring these activities again is
4 time consuming and costly and --

5 MS. MILLER: Mm-hm.

6 ALJ MATHEWS: -- duplicative.

7 So are you saying -- so -- that is something --
8 if we were to dismiss this application without
9 prejudice, that is something -- you could seek this
10 waiver again, if you have already completed these
11 activities; correct?

12 MS. MILLER: Yes, we can.

13 I would like to just make sure that we're clear
14 on one point, that -- you know, the projected exhaust
15 date is, yes, pushed out to, you know, what seems like a
16 long amount of time, to 2030. But we need a Commission
17 decision -- I believe it's 18 months prior to that --
18 so, you know, a year and a half. And then, as we also
19 mentioned before, the -- the projected exhaust date
20 is -- can be changed. We evaluate the industry demand
21 according to FCC rules every six months. And that does
22 change. So we do it in other states as well.

23 And other states, their particular preference
24 is to sometimes keep it on the books. And that way the
25 docket is open, and we can file updates as needed, and

1 that sort of thing. So that's just sort of where we're
2 coming from, we just want to make sure that we're doing
3 the right thing, obviously for the industry, but also
4 for the Commission. So we're definitely willing to work
5 with the Commission's preference on this.

6 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay. Well, I will discuss it
7 with the commissioner. Because he has the final say in
8 overseeing how this is determined, as far as the scope
9 of the proceeding would be concerned. But let me
10 discuss it with the office.

11 Just to be clear though, so is the -- this
12 update, I believe we got, pushing out the exhaust date
13 that -- to Q1 2030, you filed that in April which was a
14 few months ago. So when would the next update be --
15 when would the next six-month update be coming? Is that
16 in October, is my -- I think it's April and October that
17 you get those updates; is that right?

18 MS. WEBER: That is correct, your Honor.

19 MS. MILLER: And that was Florence Weber.

20 (Crosstalk.)

21 ALJ MATHEWS: And I've been -- oh, one more
22 thing is: I've been working -- as far as I've seen
23 these proceedings in the last few -- couple years I've
24 been working on them, I haven't seen the date move
25 closer; I've seen them only go out further. So is it

1 the case that -- it seems like there's been a -- in the
2 filings you've submitted as of late, there's been a
3 reduction in demand so that the exhaust date is getting
4 pushed out.

5 Are you seeing any reversal in trend -- in that
6 trend? Because it seems like the demand is decreasing
7 such that the exhaust date is getting pushed out.

8 MS. WEBER: That is correct. We are seeing the
9 demand lessening, so we are seeing the exhaust dates
10 pushing out. And that could occur again when we
11 revisited the exhaust projections in October of this
12 year.

13 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay.

14 MS. MILLER: And this is Kimberly Miller again.
15 It does happen the other direction. It has happened in
16 the past, so that is a possibility. But I -- you know,
17 Ms. Weber is the expert on what's going on in this area
18 code right now.

19 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay. Okay.

20 Well, I understand the commissioner is aware,
21 also, of the activities that have been undertaken
22 already, as far as the proceeding is concerned -- as far
23 as the NPA. So it's a matter of, I guess, balancing
24 that with the timeline of leaving the proceeding open
25 and where we need to act considering both of those --

1 both of those factors. So I will discuss it with the
2 commissioner's office and provide some update once I can
3 discuss it with the office.

4 But, thank you for your input. Do you -- do
5 either of you or any of the parties or attendees have
6 anything else they would like to add?

7 I just wanted to give an update of what -- the
8 purpose of the call today was to just give an update on
9 what the Commission's intention was. But we wanted to
10 also get your input or thoughts on the matter. So, like
11 I said, I will discuss it with the office and see what
12 they -- what they think.

13 But is there anything else that you would like
14 to add today, Ms. Miller or Ms. Weber?

15 MS. MILLER: This is Kimberly Miller.

16 No. I would just say that our overall approach
17 here is just to make sure that we're all on the same
18 page as to understanding, you know, what the projected
19 exhaust means. And I think we are. And then, we just
20 want to say that we do want the work with the
21 Commission. So that's where we stand.

22 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay. Thank you.

23 And, Ms. Weber, did you have anything to add?

24 MS. WEBER: No, your Honor.

25 ALJ MATHEWS: Okay. Thank you.

1 And anything from you, Mr. Culver?

2 MR. CULVER: No, your Honor. Thank you.

3 ALJ MATHEWS: All right. Well, thank you.

4 Like I said, I will discuss that with the commissioner's
5 office and follow up with an update or a decision, if
6 that's the course that we go. But I will follow up --
7 probably even if there is a decision, I will follow up
8 with an email before that to advise you of where things
9 are headed.

10 Thank you for your time today. I appreciate
11 the input. We are adjourned.

13 having been concluded, the Commission then
14 adjourned.)
