RESOLUTION

RESOLUTION M-4880 MODIFICATION OF THE COST ALLOCATION METHOD USED TO FUND THE SUPPLIER CLEARINGHOUSE SUBJECT TO GENERAL ORDER 156.

SUMMARY

This Resolution adopts modifications to the cost allocation method used to fund the Clearinghouse of diverse suppliers subject to General Order 156. The modification would base cost allocation on procurement spending instead of California revenues.

BACKGROUND

Supplier Diversity Program

In 1986, the California Legislature passed Assembly Bill (AB) 3678 (Moore, Chapter 1259, Statutes of 1986) to encourage awarding a fair proportion of total utility contracts to women business enterprises (WBE) and minority business enterprises (MBE). Subsequently, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC or Commission) issued General Order (GO) 156 to implement the bill by establishing the CPUC Supplier Diversity Program framework and guidelines.

The current GO 156 (since April 2022), provides the basis for the CPUC's Supplier Diversity Program that promotes utilities', CCAs', and covered entities' supplier diversity programs as well as oversees a certification clearinghouse (the Supplier Clearinghouse).¹

GO 156 requires electric utilities, gas utilities, water utilities, wireless telecommunications service providers, telephone utilities, and electric service providers with gross annual California revenues exceeding \$15,000,000 and their Commission-regulated subsidiaries and affiliates to submit annual plans and reports for purposes of increasing procurement in all categories from business enterprises owned and controlled

by women (WBE), minority (MBE), disabled veteran (DVBE), lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT), and persons with disabilities business enterprises (PDBE).²

GO 156 encourages the participating utilities and covered entities to purchase 15 percent from MBEs; 5 percent from WBEs; 1.5 percent from DVBEs; and 1.5 percent from LGBTBEs. There is currently no goal for persons with disabilities enterprises (PDBE).

Supplier Clearinghouse History

To ensure business enterprises are available to support the goals of the supplier diversity program, the Commission established The Supplier Clearinghouse (Clearinghouse)³ to audit and verify the status of business enterprises as eligible suppliers and to develop and maintain a database of eligible suppliers that is accessible to the Commission, utilities, and other covered entities.

Originally, audit and verification of eligible suppliers was handled by an outside vendor operating under Commission-approved guidelines. The utilities reimbursed the Commission for these Clearinghouse costs based on an existing cost-sharing formula. Subsequently, however, the California Department of General Services (DGS) advised that these functions could be performed by state civil servants and, therefore, should not be outsourced. In response, the Commission initiated Rulemaking (R.) 06-04-011 and issued Decision (D.)06-08-031, proposing the establishment of a utility-funded Clearinghouse managed through a utility-formed entity or arrangement.

On September 25, 2006, the Joint Utilities (JU) submitted a proposal regarding program costs. The JU recommended that:

Persons with disabilities was added to the Supplier Diversity Program by the Commission.

"The Clearinghouse's costs be funded by the utilities that are subject to General Order (GO) 156. The proportion of funding per utility will continue to be based on gross California jurisdictional revenue and will be updated by the utilities every three years."

The Commission adopted this proposal through Resolution CSID-001 on January 11, 2007, authorizing the JU to begin making payments and to assume administrative responsibilities for the Clearinghouse by January 31, 2007. For the years 2021- 2023, the average cost to fund the Clearinghouse was \$1,000,000 per year.

Commission Motion to Modify the Cost Allocation Method Used to Fund the Clearinghouse

The Commission, through authority granted by GO 156, is required to periodically review the performance of the JU entity and its administration of the Clearinghouse function of the Suppler Diversity Program. In August 2024, staff sent a data request to program participants requesting California revenues for all Commission- regulated entities, subsidiaries and affiliates (California revenues) for the previous three years (2021-2023). As part of its review, staff completed an analysis of the cost allocation methodology established by Resolution CSID-001 for the years 2012-2014, 2017-2019 and 2021-2023.

This Resolution (M-4880), presents a proposal to modify the cost allocation method used to fund the Clearinghouse to more equitably distribute program costs among industries and to further align cost sharing with the purpose of GO 156.

DISCUSSION

Gross Jurisdictional Revenue Results in Inequitable Cost Distribution

Staff analyzed data from 2012-2014, 2017-2019, and 2021-2023 and found that using California revenues as the cost allocation methodology to fund the Clearinghouse results in a disproportionate cost allocation to electric and gas utilities.

Cost sharing based on revenue approach:

- 2012-2014
 - o electric and gas utilities: 70.93%

o communications companies: 25.95%

o water utilities: 3.11%

• 2017-2019

o electric and gas utilities: 76.90%

o communications companies: 19.12%

o water utilities: 3.99%.

• 2021-2023

o electric and gas companies: 70.15%

o communications companies: 26.89%

o water utilities: 2.96%

Despite the intent to share costs, the current approach allocates the majority of expenses to the energy industry.

Procurement Spend with Diverse Suppliers is the Primary Metric of GO 156

The purpose of GO 156 is to increase procurement from diverse business enterprises.⁷ The procurement metrics⁸ (see Attachment A) outlined in GO 156 demonstrate the performance of participating entities in meeting the objectives of the Supplier Diversity Program.

These metrics include net procurement and total supplier diversity spend Utilities also report both the dollar amount and percentage of total supplier diversity spend in each diverse category, with a detailed breakdown of procurement spend by type of product or service, by direct and subcontractor expenditures, and by Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) codes. These reporting requirements highlight that procurement, rather than revenue, is the basis for participation in the program. Revenue serves only to determine eligibility as required by GO 156 and has no relationship to program metrics or outcomes.

Staff therefore recommend revising the cost allocation methodology to be based on average net procurement over a three-year period, with updates at least every five years, as set forth in the administrative agreement between the JU and the Clearinghouse.

The procurement approach results in a more equitable distribution of costs. Basing cost sharing on revenue would require entities with the highest revenue to pay the most regardless of program activity. This proposed methodology also improves transparency, as procurement data is publicly reported in annual report filings⁹, whereas revenue data is submitted confidentially to the Commission.

Following are examples of how costs would have been allocated historically based on this new proposed methodology:

• 2012-2014

o electric and gas utilities: 51.52%

o communications companies: 46.77%

o water utilities: 1.71%

• 2017–2019

o electric and gas utilities: 40.40%

o communications companies: 57.68%


o water utilities: 1.92%


• 2021-2023

o electric and gas utilities: 47.18%

o communications companies: 51.07%

o water utilities: 1.75%

CONCLUSION

Staff determined that using the three-year average California revenues methodology to fund the Clearinghouse results in a disproportionate cost allocation to electric and gas utilities. Using average three-year net procurement as the basis for cost allocation more closely aligns with program goals, results in a more equitable distribution of costs, and increases program transparency.

COMMENTS

Public Utilities Code section 311(g)(1) provides that this resolution must be served on all parties and subject to at least 30 days public review. Section 311(g)(2) provides that this 30-day review period and 20-day comment period may be reduced or waived upon the stipulation of all parties in the proceeding.

The 30-day review and 20-day comment period for the draft of this resolution was neither waived nor reduced. Accordingly, this draft resolution was mailed to interested stakeholders on the D.15-06-007, D.22-04-035, and D.24-09-035 service lists for comments on October 31, 2025.

The Commission received two comments from US Telecom and CTIA rejecting the Draft Resolution in full. A summary of their comments is discussed below.

US Telecom and CTIA respectfully oppose the proposal in Draft Resolution M-4880 to change the Supplier Clearinghouse funding methodology from the current revenue-based model to one based on net procurement. They note that participation under General Order 156 is determined by revenue, and that the existing allocation method was established through Joint Utility consensus and adopted by the Commission in Resolution CSID-001. While the Commission may review Clearinghouse performance, they assert that it does not have the authority to alter the cost allocation structure, which remains within the discretion of the Joint Utilities as the contracting entity.

According to both organizations, shifting to a procurement-based formula would result in inequitable outcomes, including concentrating approximately 80 percent of total costs on only five of the twenty-eight reporting entities. They further note that such a shift would disproportionately affect telecommunications providers whose procurement activity supports interstate networks, and could disincentivize increased procurement, including diverse supplier engagement encouraged by the Commission.

They further emphasize that no participating entity has requested this change, and no evidence has been presented that the current revenue-based method is inequitable or ineffective. US Telecom and CTIA maintain that the longstanding approach supports

broad participation and aligns with the intent of GO 156 and therefore recommends retaining the existing funding methodology.

The comments submitted by US Telecom and CTIA do not present compelling justification for retaining the current revenue-based cost allocation model. Their argument incorrectly evaluates eligibility criteria under GO 156 over program purpose. While revenue determines participation, it is procurement, not revenue, that reflects activity, impact, and alignment with program objectives. Cost allocation should therefore be grounded in procurement activity, which directly drives demand for Clearinghouse certification services and access.

During multiple Joint Utility meetings, allocation was discussed with recommendations to reconsider and update the methodology; therefore, the assertion that the Commission lacks authority to revise the cost allocation method is inconsistent with its responsibility under GO 156 to review and oversee Clearinghouse administration, particularly as the proposed modification is grounded in a comprehensive performance analysis and directly supports the principles of equity, proportionality, and transparency.

Concerns that a procurement-based model would discourage supplier engagement are speculative and unsupported. Linking costs to procurement strengthens accountability and aligns financial responsibility with program utilization. Furthermore, using multi-year averages mitigates volatility and prevents undue cost shifts in any single reporting year.

In short, the proposed procurement-based allocation more accurately reflects program participation and promotes fair cost distribution across industries. US Telecom and CTIA offer no substantive evidence that the current methodology better serves the program or that the proposed change would adversely affect supplier diversity outcomes. Their opposition appears driven by cost avoidance rather than alignment with the goals of GO 156.

Accordingly, staff conclude that the proposed modification should be adopted as drafted.

FINDINGS

1. GO 156 is mandated by California law and requires electric utilities, gas utilities, water utilities, wireless telecommunications service providers, telephone utilities, and electric service providers with gross annual California revenues exceeding \$15,000,000 and their Commission- regulated subsidiaries and affiliates to submit annual plans and reports for purposes of increasing procurement in all categories from business enterprises owned and controlled by women (WBE), minority, disabled veteran (MBE), lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT), and persons with disabilities business enterprises (PDBE).

2. The purpose of GO 156 is to increase procurement from diverse business enterprises.

- 3. The procurement metrics outlined in GO 156 demonstrate the performance of participating entities in meeting the objectives of the Supplier Diversity Program.
- 4. In August 2024, Staff sent a data request to entities participating in the Supplier Diversity program requesting three-year average California revenues data from 2021-2023.
- 5. Staff completed an analysis of three-year average California revenue data from 2012-2014, 2017- 2019 and 2021-2023 and average net procurement data from the same periods as part of its periodic review of the performance and administration of the Clearinghouse function of the Suppler Diversity Program.
- 6. Based on its review, Staff determined using the three-year average California revenue methodology to fund the Clearinghouse results in a disproportionate financial allocation to electric and gas utilities.
- 7. Using average three-year net procurement as the basis for cost allocation more closely aligns with program goals, results in a more equitable distribution of costs, and increases program transparency.
- 8. A notice letter was emailed on October 31, 3025 interested stakeholders on the D.15-06-007, D.22-04-035, and Decision 24-09-035 service lists of the availability of this draft Resolution and the opportunity to comment. The draft Resolution was publicized on the Commission's website at http://www.cpuc.ca.gov. This letter also informed interested stakeholders that the final confirmed Resolution adopted by the Commission will be posted and available on this same website.
- 9. The Commission received 2 comments.
- 10. There are no safety considerations associated with this Resolution.

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED THAT:

1. The Commission's own motion to modify the cost allocation method used to fund the Clearinghouse of diverse suppliers subject to General Order 156, to be based average three-year net procurement beginning with the years 2026-2028, is adopted.

This Resolution is effective today.
