4	0 1	What is the number of your testiment in this Application?
4	Q. I.	What is the purpose of your testimony in this Application?
5 6	A. 1.	As indicated in my Statement of Qualifications, I am Resource Innovations'
7		Principal of Stakeholder Engagement and Communications for CalMTA. In that
8		role, I have overseen all aspects of the recruitment, conflict of interest rules, and
9		compensation policy for the Market Transformation Advisor Board (MTAB). I am
10		providing this testimony as part of this Application where the MTAB has played a
11		central role in the solicitation and selection of the two initial MTI proposals that
12		CalMTA has brought before the Commission for its approval in this Application.
13		
14	Q. 2.	As a starting point, can you give us a summary of what the Commission required
15		and expected in terms of the creation, roles, and responsibilities of the MTAB?
16		
17	A. 2.	Yes. By Decision (D.)19-12-021, the Commission directed the formation of the
18		MTAB for the purpose of its members to offer unbiased expertise and non-
19		binding recommendations to CalMTA and the Commission in the selection,
20		development, and implementation of market transformation initiatives (MTIs). To
21		that end, OP 8 of D.19-12-021 required CalMTA to: 1) manage a process to
22		designate the Market Transformation Advisory Board (MTAB), to advise CalMTA
23		on its plans and activities; 2) ensure that the MTAB is diverse and from a broad
24		set of perspectives within the national or international energy efficiency (EE)
25		community.; 3) develop conflict-of-interest (COI) rules for the MTAB in
26		consultation with Commission staff and file the proposed membership and COI

rules in a Tier 2 advice letter; and 4) compensate MTAB members for their time

and travel expenses.

1	D.19-12-021 allowed the MTAB to have up to nine members, including two non-
2	voting, ex-officio members,1 one member to represent the investor-owned utilities
3	(IOUs) and one member to represent the Regional Energy Networks
4	(RENs)/Community Choice Aggregators (CCAs), both the IOU and REN/CCA
5	members are self-select by mutual agreement of their constituents.

Q. 3. What steps did CalMTA take to comply first with the recruitment requirements D.19-12-021?

A. 3. To recruit the remaining five MTAB members, outreach activities were conducted 10 to ensure interested parties were aware of the opportunity including working with 11 12 various EE, environmental advocacy, equity focused, and ratepayer advocacy organizations to share information about the formation of MTAB. In addition, a 13 notice about the opportunity to apply was sent to the EE proceeding service list 14 15 (R.13-11-005) and shared via CalMTA's newsletter. Finally, D.19-12-021 included 16 an MTAB seat for a CCA EE professional. However, after consultation with 17 Commission staff on January 9, 2023, it was agreed that the CCA's MTAB seat 18 would be for both CCAs and RENs. The RENs and CCAs agreed to confer and select a representative for their category.² 19

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Q. 4. How does the MTAB membership comply with requirements of D.19-12-021?

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- A. 4. The MTAB members represent all the required backgrounds described in Attachment A of the D.19-12-0213 including:
 - Ratepayer advocacy/protection
 - Workforce and/or labor

2		Evaluation professional
3		National/regional energy efficiency policy professional
4		IOU energy efficiency representative
5		Community Choice Aggregator (CCA) energy efficiency professional
6		
7		CalMTA filed Advice Letter RI-CalMTA-1-A on April 10, 2023, detailing its MTAB
8		member selection process and proposed MTAB members in compliance with
9		D.19-12-021. No concerns about CalMTA's process for seeking and selecting
10		MTAB members or the diversity of MTAB representation were raised in the
11		comments received on the advice letter or by CPUC Energy Division staff in
12		discussions with CalMTA, and, on May 17, 2023, AL RI-CalMTA-1-A was
13		approved by Energy Division disposition letter.
14		
15	Q. 5.	How did CalMTA develop Conflict-of-Interest (COI) rules for the MTAB?
16		
17	A. 5.	CalMTA consulted with Commission staff on the COI rules between December 8,
18		2022, and February 21, 2023. Commission staff advised CalMTA to add language
19		to the COI rules stating that MTAB members cannot receive funding, directly or
20		indirectly, from CalMTA contracts, including Resource Innovations and its
21		subcontractors: Cadmus, 2050 Partners, The Ortiz Group, Brio, and Unrooz
22		Solutions.
23		
24		The MTAB COI rules require MTAB members to provide an annual written
25		disclosure of any financial relationships the MTAB member, family members, or
26		employer may have with CalMTA's lead implementer, Resource Innovations, or
27		the subcontractors listed above. These disclosure forms are posted for public
28		access on CalMTA's MTAB website page. On May 17, 2023, the COI, which as

1		included in AL RI-CalMTA-1-A, was approved by Energy Division disposition
2		letter.
3		
4	Q. 6.	Did CalMTA develop a compensation policy for MTAB members?
5		
6	A. 6.	Yes, CalMTA developed a compensation policy in consultation with Commission
7		staff. The compensation policy was included and approved in Appendix A of
8		Advice Letter RI-CalMTA-1-A. CalMTA also created a handbook for MTAB
9		members on our compensation policy.4
10		
11	Q. 7.	Does that conclude your testimony?
12		
13	A. 7.	Yes.
